

*Class 7 English Worksheet: Sentence Foundations (Detailed Instruction Edition)**[L2P3: Divide Complete Subject and Complete Predicate]*

Instructions for Students: Every sentence is made of two main parts.

- 1. The Complete Subject: Who or what the sentence is about (including all the descriptive words attached to it).*
- 2. The Complete Predicate: What the subject is doing, or what is happening to it (starts from the main verb and goes to the end of the sentence).*

Task: Rewrite each sentence below and place a vertical line (|) right between the Complete Subject and the Complete Predicate.

Hint: Some sentences might be inverted (turned around), so find the main action verb first to help you locate the true subject!

- 2. A large flock of migratory birds flew gracefully over the blue hills.*
- 3. The creative students of the seventh grade painted a beautiful mural.*

[L2P4: Spot the Error in Subject-Verb Agreement]

Instructions for Students: There is an error in the verb usage in each of these sentences because it does not agree with its true subject. Find the incorrect verb, underline it, and then rewrite the entire sentence correctly with the proper verb form.

Tip: Watch out for collective nouns, words ending in 's' that are actually singular, and phrases like 'as well as' or 'together with' that can distract you from the main subject.
